## IMPORTANT INFORMATION YOU SHOULD KNOW

CMS<sup>®</sup> and The Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC) have made two important rules concerning API use<sup>1</sup>:

1. <u>CERTIFIED EHR VENDORS MUST</u> include an open API to allow patients to access their data via any application that uses the API standards. Your EHR is using FHIR® to meet that requirement.

## 2. HOSPITALS/PROVIDERS MUST:

- A. Allow patients to access their health information using any application of their choice that uses FHIR.
- **B.** Provide patients with detailed instructions on how to authenticate their access through the FHIR app and provide the patient with supplemental information on available applications that use FHIR.
- C. Offer patients access to their data via FHIR apps within specific timelines indicated below:
  - Promoting Interoperability Eligible Hospitals within 36 hours of discharge
  - Medicaid Eligable Professionals within 48 hours of the information being available
  - MIPS Promoting Interoperability Eligible Clinicians within 4 business days of the information being available

## Q: WHAT'S AN API?

A: An <u>Application Programming Interface</u> is a set of standards to allow the flow of information from one system into another system. An example is the electrical outlet. The outlets are built to a specific standard. If an appliance plug is built with those standards, electricity will flow from the outlet into the appliance.



## Q: WHAT'S FHIR?

**A:** Fast Health Interoperability Resources is an API standard for exchanging electronic health records. It was developed by an international standards organization (HL7)® and is used globally.
